

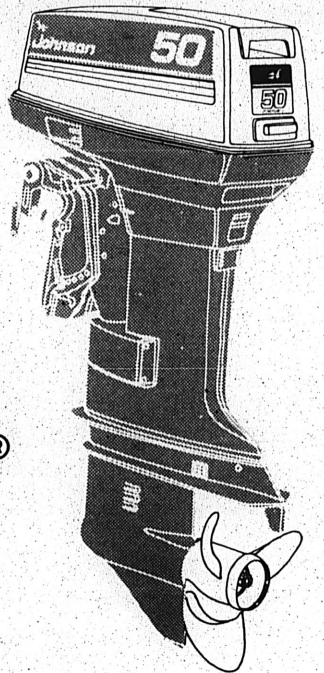
AFN, Inc. Aids Chenega

Chenega is a Native village located in the Prince William Sound. After the 1964 earthquake three tidal waves hit the village destroying homes and taking 23 lives.

The 55 survivors of the tidal wave were relocated to near-by Tatitlek and eventually migrated to Cordova. As a result of the Alaska Native Claims Act, the residents of Chenega are now involved in the process of revitalizing their community under the leadership of Nick Kompkoff, Village Corporation President.

The Technical Assistance Division of AFN, Inc. is presently coordinating the two main objectives of the Chenega relocation project which are: 1) to re-establish the community (housing), and 2) re-establish a combination of industries which would be self-supporting such as timber, fisheries, tourism, etc. With respect to both, many studies are being prepared by various agencies.

Short Course at UA—Homemakers from All Alaska

Homemakers came from all over Alaska to attend the 26th annual University Days Short Course held at the University of Alaska June 9-13.

The program was sponsored by the Cooperative Extension at the university, along with the Alaska State Extension Homemakers Council, of which many who attended the short course are members. The Homemakers Council held its annual meeting during the week they were here.

Among topics in the program were: Women and the Law, Enriching a Marriage, first aid, bead work, carving, needlepoint, silk screening, and preservation of foods.

About 125 persons attended, and according to Jane Windsor, of Cooperative Extension, many new people were in attendance. They stayed in student housing in the upper complex on campus where they held their meetings and classes.

Those who attended the week-long course are representative of over 1000 members in 80 groups of Homemakers Council around the state, who meet annually at the Short Course.

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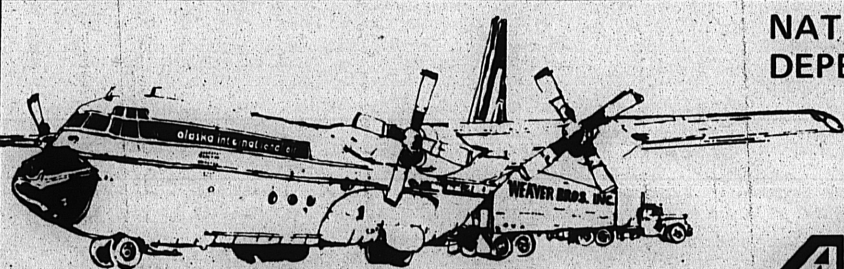

A completed application by the Ridgeview Care Corporation for a 64-bed addition to its Careage North Convalescent Center accepted for review by the Department on April 17 has been determined to be in conformance with standards and criteria established under the Public Health Service Act. It has been recommended that the amounts attributable to this capital expenditure not be excluded in determining payments under Titles V, XVIII and XIX of the Social Security Act for services furnished by the applicant. This finding is in agreement with that of the State Hill-Burton agency.

Located at 19 Avenue and Gilliam Way, Fairbanks, the addition is expected to cost \$830,759 with a projected completion date of January 1976.
