## Taxation

Payments received by eligible Alaskan residents under Alaska Statute 47.45.010 through 47.45.017, commonly referred to as the "Old-Timers' Bonus," are subject to federal taxation according to Charles E. Roddy, Anchorage District Director of the Internal Revenue Service.

Mr. Roddy stated that the federal taxation clause is written into the state law. Any taxpayer with questions about this tax is encouraged to contact the IRS.

## Specialized Electronics Training

Specialized training in electronics is now available to high school graduates who can qualify for the Navy's Advanced Electronics Field Program, according to Chief Jess L. Houghton, Navy Recruiter for the Interior Alaskan area.

Chief Houghton stated that trained professionals in electronics are needed in the Navy for service as Electronic Technicians. Starting salary for those selected for the program is currently about \$377 per month.

The total commitment to the Navy for the Advanced Electronics Field is six years, which includes about 12-18 months training learning to maintain, repair, calibrate, align, and adjust communication equipment, radio aids to navigation, radio countermeasures equipment, radio direction finding equipment, loran receiving equipment and radio beacons.

Civilian occupations where a Navy veteran can use his service training and experience include: electronics field serviceman, electronics or instrument mechanic, electrician, or a repairman specializing in radio, TV, radar, computers, or test equipment.

This project will consist of grading, drainage, riprap, and crushed gravel surfacing on 5.0 miles of roadway. Included in the work will be 5-prestressed concrete girder bridges all providing for a minimum clear width of 28 ft. The project is located near Valdez, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 600,000 cubic yards of unclassified excavation; 64,000 tons of borrow; 700,000 yard miles of haul; 30,000 tons of subbase C; 1,000 linear feet of 24" corrugated aluminum pipe and 900 linear feet of 48" corrugated aluminum pipe; 100,000 tons of shot rock riprap; 4,300 linear feet of structural steel pipe; approximately 185 cubic yards of class A concrete and 45,000 pounds of reinforcing steel, lump sum, all required; 56 each prestressed concrete girders; 2,742 linear feet of metal bridge railing; 11,000 tons of class A riprap; and miscellaneous items of work.

All work shall be completed in 184 Calendar days.

NOTICE OF FILING OF TARIFF REVISION

The ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION hereby gives notice that RCA ALASKA COMMUNICATIONS, INC., (RCA ALASKA) has made three filings of tariff revisions designated as T-29-98, T-30-98, and T-31-98) consisting of the following:

T-29-98 would increase the monthly rates for Rural Wire Telephone Service (Farmer Line). The new increased charges would be based on the distance of a subscriber from the utility's switching center. Residence one party rates would vary from \$22.50 to \$35.00 per month compared to the present flat \$12.00, and residence ten party rates would be from \$10.00 to \$20.00; the present rate being \$6.00 per month. Business service would cost somewhat more. RCA Alascom asserts that these proposed rates are designed to reduce the current losses now incurred by the company in providing this service. T-30-98 proposes to delete the monthly \$35.00 charge to each village having a Rural Radio Telephone (Bush Telephone). The utility would introduce instead a usage charge on local calls. There would be a per minute charge of 10 cents with an initial period of 3 minutes (30 cents). RCA Alascom states that such a charge will result in (a) improved circuit usage discipline, (b) fewer problems regarding call back time and charges from the operator, and (c) equalization of cost during those periods of time when the villages do not make use of telephones, i.e., during winter months as opposed to summer fishing season.

T-31-98 consists of: (a) a general restructuring and reduction in the message mileage bands (resulting in an overall increase in intrastate telephone rates); (b) a proposed new rate for subscriber-dialed calls; (c) an increase in the number of holidays when the low night rate would apply to include Thanksgiving, New Year's Day, Independence Day, and Alaska Statehood Day; (d) a proposed change in the time periods that deletes the former evening period and establishes the low night rate from 8:00 P.M. to 8:00 A.M. Monday through Friday rather than the present hours of 7:00 P.M. to 7:00 A.M. Monday through Friday. RCA Alascom states that this proposed tariff revision will result in a 47.95% increase in intrastate rates, but will be offset by the effect of message transmission discounts and a shift in the direct distance dialing pattern to the extent that the overall revenue increase would be reduced to 39.69%.

NORTH SLOPE BOROUGH PLANNING COMMISSION RESOLUTION SERIAL NO. 74-1 A RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE NORTH SLOPE BOROUGH WHEREAS, Public television can be an important media for communication between the residents of Barrow and other villages within the North Slope Borough, and

WHEREAS, Educational television can provide materials for viewing that are not available from most commercial television sources, including information and culturally enriching programming, and

WHEREAS, There appears to be little opportunity to find any private enterprise that will enter the field of educational public television with programming that would allow locally produced programs, utilizing both English and the Inupiat Eskimo languages in addition to educational programming produced by the Public Broadcasting System and other commercial sources, at low cost to the community, and

WHEREAS, The Planning Commission of the North Slope Borough has researched the advisability of commissioning the North Slope Borough as the licensee for an educational station for the Barrow area, and

WHEREAS, It has been determined by the Planning Commission that full implementation of this program would be beneficial for the people of the North Slope Borough upon further development,

BE IT FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, by the Planning Commission of the North Slope Borough that the Borough School Board proceed with the necessary requirements finalizing the establishment of an educational public television station for the Barrow area, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of Barrow is urged to concur in this arrangement and permit the North Slope Borough School Board to proceed.
