Villages of Ugashik and Pilot Point Run Out of Fuel

Residents of two tiny Southeastern Alaska villages running low on fuel oil have had little response so far from the state to a plea that Gov. William Egan provide immediate disaster assistance.

Reports from the Bristol Bay Area Development Corp., Dillingham, indicated Monday that while the Bureau of Indian Affairs has assessed the situation no move has been made to bring in stove oil to Pilot Point and Ugashik.

"They have enough money

to buy the oil, but not for the transportation," said Mark Johnson, program development spe-

cialist for the corporation.

Johnson went with BIA representative Jim Dayton during the weekend to the homes of 25 residents of Ugashik and another 70 in Pilot Point to check on whom was eligible for

various types of assistance.

Johnson said many personal questions were asked at each
