

Timber is Sold on Five Allotments

BBNC Concerned About Fish — Directors Review No-Fishing Possibility

Timber sales totaling \$301,710.50 on five Native allotments in the Port Graham area were recently finalized according to BIA Acting Area Director Clarence Antioquia. "The high prices paid for this timber will go directly to the individual allotment owners," he stated.

Kenai Lumber Company of Seward, Alaska was high bidder on the estimated 6,631,000 board feet of timber contained on 584 acres of land in the Port Graham vicinity.

The sale was conducted by the Bureau of Indian Affairs in the Anchorage Agency Office on Jan. 15, 1974. Sales receipts to individual allottees ranged from \$97,300 to \$17,722.

Antioquia explained that BIA is involved with sales of this nature because "Native allotments have restricted deeds. This type of deed makes the bureau responsible for preparation and administration of sales on land or natural resources such as timber."

Timber sales are made only at the request of the allotment owner," he continued. "We have a small staff of foresters who can do surveys, assess the value of the timber, evaluate the impact on the environment, and invite companies to bid on the lumber by advertising it for sale.

All Native allotment owners and prospective timber sale purchasers should be aware of this regulation. Anyone having questions or wishing more information should contact my office," Antioquia explained.

The Bristol Bay Native Corporation Board of Directors met in Dillingham Jan. 17-18, to discuss items of vital concern regarding the economy of Bristol Bay. The board is concerned about the possibility that Bristol Bay people will not fish this year.

Governor Egan was invited to attend this meeting, but could not be present due to pressing business at the Capitol. Clark Boston was present to represent the governor.

The Bristol Bay Native Corporation Investment Portfolio was reviewed with Gary Coburn of Scudder, Stevens, and Clark. The corporation's responsibilities under Section 8 of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act was discussed and a procedure for approving budgets was established.

Plans for the upcoming Shareholders meeting were outlined and a tentative date of March 2-3 still stands.

A nominating committee was appointed to begin the process of preparing ballots for the election of board members as well as other activities related to preparation for the Shareholders meeting.

The board also reviewed the Bristol Bay Native Corporation office building plans.

The board voiced their concerns for Bristol Bay to the governor's representative in the event there is no fishing. Questions regarding legislation to alleviate the impact of replacing income normally earned was discussed.

In addition the board was

interested in what the governor will do if the Japanese continue their high seas effort of catching Bristol Bay salmon.

Finally the board passed a resolution supporting the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation in their efforts to hold a Bristol Bay International Marine Fisheries Conference in Bristol Bay.

BBNA Awarded State Grant

JUNEAU Governor William A. Egan said a \$20,000 grant has been awarded to the Bristol Bay Native Association for assistance in developing economic alternatives to diminished salmon runs there.

The grant was made through the rural development assistance division in the Alaska Department of Community and Regional Affairs. It is being made in two payments, one now and another in July.

The governor said the funds will pay for efforts toward developing fresh water fisheries, herring fisheries, recreation and tourist related industries, marketing cooperative and arts and crafts programs, and other possible methods of bolstering Bristol Bay's economy.

"This grant has the support of all 29 villages within the Bristol Bay region along with the active support of many concerned Alaskans," Egan said.

"Along with the state's programs to rehabilitate Bristol Bay salmon stocks, this state assistance grant will help develop a stronger and more diversified economy for the Bristol Bay area."

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Management Training Program is Scheduled at Barrow

FAIRBANKS — A management training program sponsored by the University of Alaska will be held in Barrow from Feb. 18-23.

The program was designed especially for North Slope Borough employees and personnel of the regional corporations set up under the Native Land Claims Settlement Act. However, according to Dr. Mildred Matthews, other interested persons are welcome to attend.

Matthews helped set up the program. She is coordinator of tourism, business and adult vocational training for the univer-

sity's Division of Statewide Services on the Fairbanks campus.

The Barrow coordinator of the management training program is David Fauske, a U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs employee in Barrow and the University of Alaska representative there.

Dr. Earl Peterson, business manager for the university's Northern Region, and Jeff J. Cook, an associate of the Earl E. Cook Real Estate firm of Fairbanks, will participate in the program.

Peterson will speak on such topics as planning and organizing, records, the language of business, profits and personnel.

Cook will instruct in real estate management, including land, structures, appraisal and assessment. He will also give information on legality, return on investment, taxes and hotel development.

The training group will meet from 10-12 a.m. and 4-6 p.m. daily. The fee for the program will be \$25; interested persons may contact David Fauske, University of Alaska representative, Barrow, Alaska 99723.
