NOTICE TO CLASS MEMBERS  
NO. 713-73C-2

TO: All non-white individuals who at any time since January 30, 1971 were employed by New England Fish Company ("Nefco") as its Chatham, Egegik, Ugashik, Waterfall or Pederson Point facilities.

Who applied for employment with Nefco at any of these facilities.

Who were denied from applying for employment with Nefco at any of these facilities.  
PLEASE READ CAREFULLY  
YOUR RIGHTS MAY BE AFFECTED  
PURPOSE OF THIS NOTICE

The purpose of this notice is to advise you of a settlement in the case against Nefco. This notice also explains the steps you must take if you wish to recover damages under or object to the settlement.

HISTORY OF THE LAWSUIT

The lawsuit was started by five former employees of Nefco, who charged that the company discriminated on the basis of race in hiring, promotion, termination, housing and other aspects of employment. They are Nemesio Domingo, Silvio Domingo, Samuel Cabezas, Joseph Ancheta and Thomas Capriano. Six other former employees of Nefco then joined as additional plaintiffs. They are Nellie Kokash, Audrey Merculief, Frank Paul, Mary Paul, Terry Egan and Samuel Strauss. The Court allowed them to pursue this case as a class action under Rule 23, (b) (2).

Following trials and appeals, the Court ruled that Nefco intentionally discriminated on the basis of race by:

- Failing to hire or promote non-whites into administrative, ladder, mechanistic, clerical, culinary, quality control, beach gang and certain other jobs.
- Maintaining racially segregated bunkhouses and giving non-whites inferior housing.

The Court found that Nefco did not discriminate in hiring.

SETTLEMENT

The parties have agreed to settle the case as follows:

Damages

Nefco will pay \$4,600,000.00 with interest from February 9, 1987 as damages to the plaintiffs and the class.

Plaintiffs

Of the damages sum, a total of \$260,680.00 will be paid to the five individuals who first filed this lawsuit.

Housing Discrimination

Of the damages sum, about \$680,000.00 will be paid to class members for housing discrimination. Class members will be paid \$600.00 for each year during 1970-79 they worked for Nefco at Chatham, Egegik, Ugashik, Waterfall or Pederson Point. Class members need not file claims to recover housing damages.

Job Discrimination

Of the damages sum, about \$3,690,320.00 will be paid to class members for discrimination in hiring, promotion, termination and pay. This amount will be divided into sixteen different portions, each being earmarked for one season, namely, 1970, \$450,577.00; 1971, \$384,729.00; 1972, \$408,774.00; 1973, \$373,211.00; 1974, \$318,618.00; 1975, \$341,077.00; 1976, \$347,738.00; 1977, \$345,148.00; 1978, \$266,192.00; 1979, \$265,219.00; 1980, \$336,990.00. Interest which occurs on the entire damages sum will be distributed to class members as part of their recovery for job discrimination.

Class members who were denied upper-level seasonal jobs are each entitled to an equal share in the amount earmarked above for:

- Each year they applied for or were denied from applying for such jobs, and
- Each of the following three years through 1979 or each of the following consecutive years through 1979 they worked in the Alaska salmon cannery industry, whichever is greater.

Class members who were denied upper-level year-round jobs are each entitled to one fifth of a share in the amount earmarked above for:

- Each year they applied for or were denied from applying for such jobs, and
- Each of the following three years through 1980.

Class members who were terminated after 1970 because of discrimination or retaliation are each entitled to:

- An equal share in the amount earmarked above for each of the following three years through 1979 if they were terminated from an upper-level job, or
- One fifth of a share in the amount earmarked above for each of the following three years through 1979 if they were terminated from a laborer or journey worker job.

Class members denied equal pay for equal work in culinary jobs are each entitled to an equal share in the amount earmarked above for each year they held a culinary job.

Class members may recover for discrimination in hiring, promotion, termination and pay only if they filed claims in response to the Court's earlier notice. However, class members who can establish that they never received the notice may recover if they file claims with the Court by March 19, 1987. If you filed a claim, you will be contacted by the attorneys for the class to prepare a short statement establishing your eligibility to receive damages for job discrimination.

If you are the personal representative of a class member who is deceased, you should notify the Clerk in writing. You may be able to recover damages on behalf of the deceased class member's estate.

Class members are responsible for notifying the attorneys for the class of their most recent addresses.

ATTORNEYS FEES AND COSTS

Nefco will also pay \$895,000.00 as attorneys fees and \$100,000.00 as costs plus interest from February 9, 1987 to the attorneys for the class.

STEPS YOU MAY TAKE

The Court will hold a hearing on May 1, 1987 at 10:00 AM to decide whether the settlement is fair, reasonable and adequate. The hearing will be in Room 502, U.S. Courthouse, Fifth and Madison, Seattle, Washington. If you wish to be heard or object to the settlement, you should write out your reasons, put the name of the case at the top of the page and mail it to:

By April 27, 1987. The hearing will be open to all class members. You may be represented at the hearing by your own attorney, if you wish. You may also inspect the entire file in this case in the Clerk's office. If approved by the Court, the settlement will be binding on all class members.

This settlement must be approved by the bankruptcy court as well as this Court, since Nefco is in bankruptcy.

If you did not receive the Court's earlier notice but now wish to file a claim, you should mail a letter to that effect to the Clerk at the above address no later than March 19, 1987.

If you have questions about the case, would like advice on what you should do or want a copy of the settlement, you may call or write the attorneys for the class.

#### NOTICE OF DECISION DIAMOND SHAMROCK CHITINA COAL JOINT VENTURE DIAMOND CHITINA MINE

The following describes the Decision of the Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Natural Resources ("the Commissioner") with respect to a Surface Mining Permit Application submitted by Diamond Shamrock Chitina Coal Joint Venture under AS 27.21 and 11 AAC Chapter 80 (The Alaska Surface Coal Mining Program).

The permit application requests approval to develop a surface coal mine in the Beluga region of Upper Cook Inlet. The proposed mine has a maximum projected production of 12 million tons of coal per year. The project area is located on the northwest side of Cook Inlet, approximately 45 miles west of Anchorage, Alaska, and eleven miles northwest of Tyonek, Alaska. The proposed permit area includes the following lands, totaling approximately 3,596 acres:

13N	12W	Seward	14, 15, 22-27, 34, 36

In accordance with AS 27.21.180(b), the Commissioner has determined that portions of the application for the Diamond Chitina Mine must be modified before a permit can be issued. This Notice describes which portions of the application must be modified, and which parts meet approval.

Portions of the application requiring modification are those relating to sediment and drainage control, and topsoil salvage. Before a permit can be issued, the applicant must make appropriate revisions to the sediment control plan, and must prepare a topsoil salvage and handling plan. The applicant's request for a variance from topsoil salvage is denied.

All other portions of the application are approved with reservations. The Decision includes a total of 13 isolations, in the following disciplines:

Surface Mine Engineering	7 Stipulations
Fish and Wildlife Management	5 Stipulations
Sediment and Drainage Control	3 Stipulations
Overburden, Soils, Vegetation	
Revegetation and Land Use	2 Stipulations
Surface and Groundwater Hydrology	3 Stipulations
