# **Pollock's Bill Would Add to Fishing Zones**

WASHINGTON- Congressman Howard W. Pollock announced that he has introduced a bill which will increase the limits of our fishing zone beyond the present territorial limits. Pollock stated that the legal basis for such a bill already exists.

When the International Convention on the Territorial Sea and the Contingous Zone came into effect on September 10, 1964, Article 4 of the Convention made the following provision:


