

Minority Justice career program set for summer

The University of Alaska, Anchorage School of Justice will offer "Minorities and Justice Careers" from June 4-29, 1984. This 3-credit course will introduce students to the variety of career possibilities open to them in law, corrections, the court system, and police work.

It is designed particularly for Alaska Native students who have completed some college-level study, but it is also open to others who are interested in pursuing careers in the justice system.

Students will receive a brief introduction to legal study, with a special emphasis on constitutional law, and will participate in an intensive writing workshop designed to sharpen the analytic skills necessary for entrance to justice careers. Career professionals in law, law enforcement, corrections, and the court system will address the class.

In addition, each student will work individually in a chosen area of interest during a two-week internship. During the

1983 summer program, for example, students held internships in the offices of the State Public Defender, the U.S. Regional Solicitor, the Clerk of Trial Court, the District Attorney, and the Division of Corrections, as well as in private law firms.
