

WIND POWER *Need Gal Recruits—*

FAIRBANKS — A \$572,545 contract for construction of the first building for the Kotzebue Extension Center has been awarded the Fairbanks joint venture of Bonner and Hegdal by the University of Alaska.

"We hope to have beneficial occupancy of the building by next Jan. 1 and have it finally completed by July of next year," said Dr. Donald Moyer, the university's director of institutional studies and physical facilities development.

The 3,900-square-foot building is uniquely designed to take advantage of wind power at such time that a special windmill or windmills may be installed at Kotzebue, an area of high winds. Wind power would augment normal power.

A room for the bank of batteries that would be used to store windmill-supplied energy is in the plans for the building.

The new building will provide space for three classrooms, a number of offices and a library. Of frame construction with cedar plywood siding, it will be built on timber pilings.

It is being financed through sale of general obligations bonds approved by the voters last November.

There were two bidders on the project, the other being NANA Construction Corp. which submitted a base bid of \$621,800.

Bill Would Allow Indoor Pools

A bill which would allow indoor skating rinks and swimming pools to be built in Alaska with federal funds has passed the Senate.

The bill, cosponsored by U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens, has been referred to the House where it is pending consideration.

Funds established by the Land and Water Conservation Act have been limited to construction of outdoor recreational facilities. This bill specifies that up to 25 per

Be a Woman Trooper

The Department of Public Safety Division of Alaska State Troopers wants women—women applicants, that is. If you're a woman between the ages of 21 and 45 with a high school diploma or the equivalent, eyesight correctable to 20/20 and are presently living in Alaska, the State Troopers are interested in you.

"We need women trooper recruits, it's as simple as that," stated Col. Pat Wellington, Alaska State Trooper director. Only one woman has ever become an Alaska State Trooper and that was in 1972, according to Dillingham. "She got married to a trooper and quit," he added.

Wellington made it very clear that he is looking for all-around troopers and not clerks or secretaries in uniform. "These women will receive the same

assignments as their brother troopers, pull road shifts and perform other general law enforcement assignments.

After making application, women will have to pass a written exam, oral board, background clerk and physical exam just like their male counterparts. A probationary one-year period from the date of appointment concludes the examining process.

Included in that year is a 12-week recruit school at the Public Safety Academy in Sitka. There, the women must meet the same physical and scholastic requirements as the men.

While pay varies around the state, troopers are classified by the state, as a range 15. Women interested in becoming troopers should apply at their nearest state employment office or Alaska State Trooper headquarters.

UA Grant— Aid Undergraduates

FAIRBANKS — A \$1,000 grant to assist in general faculty development and provide aid to an undergraduate student in the Department of Mechanical

Engineering has been presented to the University of Alaska by the Shell Companies Foundation.

Robert C. Visser, Shell Oil Co. senior staff engineer based in Houston, Texas, presented the grant to Dr. Robert W. Hiatt, president of the university, at an informal meeting in Hiatt's office.

Also present to discuss how the funds are to be used were Earl H. Beistline, provost for the university's Northern Region, and Dr. James B. Tiedemann, head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering at Fairbanks.

The grant — third of its kind given the university by the foundation — will be divided equally for faculty development and student aid. Faculty development funds are to be used to encourage increased faculty participation in scholarly professional activities, such as attendance at professional society meetings, research and travel in the interest of scholarship.

T-H Corporation Awarded Grant

The Tlingit and Haida Corporation has been awarded a \$128,700 grant and the Alaska Native Education Board a \$190,000 grant for Indian education, U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens announced today.

The grants, from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare Education Office, are for programs to improve educational opportunities and to provide training for persons teaching Indian children.
