Port Lions Natives— Village Electric Co-op Gets \$797,454

Land Fight Against Kodiak Borough

The Native people of Port Lions are protesting an attempt by the Kodiak Island Borough to block their selection of land on the island of Afognak. The Kodiak Island Borough

Assembly passed a resolution March 2 with the intent to establish Afognak primarily as a recreation area. The Kodiak recreation area. The Kodiak Mirror reported that this was an attempt to prevent the Native people of Ouzinkie and Port Lion from going into the timber

The minutes of the Assembly meeting read: "It was unani-mously voiced that the people of the community feel that the recreation area would be of more benefit to the community than

benefit to the community than the sale of timber."

A later article on April 13, however, indicated that while blocking the Natives' claim to Afognak, under the guise of discouraging timber sales, there was some question as to whether the Borough itself had plans for the timber. the timber

the timber.

Again by unanimous consent, the Borough called for the removal of the abandoned village of Afognak from the Native Land Claims Settlement Act.

"The action was based," said

"The action was based," said the article, "on the U.S. Forest Service's expressed desire and funded plans to obtain information and collect data that is intended to benefit small timber harvest programs throughout the Kodiak Island Borough, and the fact that the villagecurrentlylisted as qualifying for land selection is unpopulated and considered to have been abandoned.

"A great injustice is about to be made on our Native people who originally lived on Afognak Island," said Mrs. Betty Lukin, president of the Native Associa-



ED WAGNER, sales manager of airbanks Insurance died of a heart attack last month while walking along the street in downtown Fairbanks. Mr. Wagner's untimely death was not only a personal tragedy, but also a blow to the community. He was active in civic affairs and an avid skier and sportsman. A member of the Greater Fair-banks Chamber of Commerce's Aviation Committee, he served as the chairman of its highly successful International Arctic Air Conference. Mr. Wagner is survived by his mother, Mrs. Eleanor Stroecker and a brother, Rick Wagner, who is also employed by the Fairbanks Insurance Agency.

"We have been trying for three years to get a fair settle-ment of land on Afognak for our people. We feel we have a right to share in a land we have owned for hundreds of years.

We have written to the Bureau of Land Management to have land withdrawal for township selections on Afognak extended to make up for useless land and water that has been given us. There has been no action taken as of yet and it has been three months since we made request.

In an open letter, published in the Kodiak Mirror, the Native people stated:

"We feel this action is unfair since the sale of timber is not our prime concern for wanting the island. We and our ancestors have hunted, fished, and trapped this land for hundreds of years

this land for hundreds of years before most of the people on KIBA ever heard of Afognak."
"Suddenly, they feel we have no rights to this land. Therefore, all must be done by the white man to prevent the Native from gaining anything because 'they' may not share in the profits of which in the past they have taken 90 per cent."

An unexpected change

teachers contracts has given rise to new disagreements between disagreements Stan Friese, Superintendent of State Operated Schools and Dis-trict One Education Association, representing the rural teachers

Roberta Alward, president of the teachers' group, picked up a sample copy of the contract from Mr. Friese's office late Monday, and discovered the

The teachers and Mr. Friese have been embroiled in negotiations from last August through April and at one point the teachers filed a suit to settle their differences.

Negotiations were resumed and the suit was subsequently dropped, although DOEA continued to ask for Mr. Friese's resignation. Nevertheless, they thought the contractual differences had been settled with the Board "in good faith".

The new contract, however contains a significant change in the wording of portion 7, and the teachers feel the clause, as it now reads, is illegal and detri-mental to the teachers.

The disputed phrase deals

with non-retention of a teacher at the expiration of a contract. Under the previous contract, the teacher has the option to request a hearing before the Commissioner of Education.

Friese's rewording changes this to read: "Before such contract shall be terminated, tea-chers shall be given the opportunity to request a hearing be-fore the SUPERINTENDENT." In other words, before Friese, rather than the Commissioner.

According to Mrs. Alward, "The teachers are really up in

"The teachers are really up in the air." over the latest policy.

Mrs. Alward questioned Mr. Friese as to when the new contract was printed. "He said in February. I asked him why he had not informed the Association of changes in the contract, and he had no answer."

In Alaska, Mrs. Alward explained the actual contract goes out only to new teachers. A teacher with tenure receives only a slip listing salary and so forth.

Therefore, had she not check-

ed the contract for the Association, no tenure teachers would have seen it and by signing the slip, would, in effect, have been signing the new contract. New teachers would have been unaware of the implications.

"The teachers are in no mood to stand for any more," said Mrs. Alward, and intend to take their greivances to the Commissioner in Juneau.
