Not All Are Poverty Programs!

In 1965, a 3-way cooperative effort between Kennecott Copper Corp., Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the College of Earth Sciences & Mineral Industry, U. of A., resulted in a new educational program for a limited number of Native people The students are given practical education for work connected with mining and the mineral industries including field trips to active mining and oil field operaations. The program requires the full academic year (8½ months) and is given in addition to the regular 4-year mining and geological curriculums.

The first class consisted of 15 students. Their ages ranged up to about 33 years; their educational background was from high school down to the 6th There was one drop-out; the other 14 went to work for Kennecott Copper Corp. at Bornite. The students surprised company officials by their aptitude in quickly learning to perform assigned tasks to the satisfaction of their employers.

The present class of 15 Native students will graduate in May 1967. Thirteen began as high school graduates. Course requirements are being tailored as experience dictates. Prof. Don Cook, head of the Department of Mineral Engineering, is to be commended for his work in pioneering this two-edged approach to Alaskan progress. The program provides practical pre-job training for men in the villages; and creates a source of reliable, low-job-turnover manpower for industry in the remote northern areas. The BIA finances this program insofar as jobs can be guaranteed to the graduates.

I believe this excellent program should be expanded as rapidly as is practical, and underwritten by the State to provide financing for the students who cannot be guaranteed jobs so as to qualify for BIA financing.
