Blasting hazards along pipeline right-of-way.


Continuous and intensive blasting along many portions of the trans-Alaska pipeline present severe hazards to low-flying aircraft. In particular, low level flights through the mountain passes or across the Valdez terminal site should be avoided; since these are areas where heavy blasting activity is scheduled.

To avoid possible flying debris, pilots should maintain a minimum altitude of 1,500 feet above ground level, or a lateral distance of one mile from the right of way.

For specific blasting information, pilots may contact an FAA flight service station, or Alyeska Advisory Stations, on 122.9 MHZ, at Sheep Creek, Tonsina, Isabel, Delta, Livengood, Five Mile, Old Man, Prospect, Coldfoot, Dietrich, Chandalar, Atigun, Galbraith, Happy Valley and Franklin Bluffs Camps

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
