

Village students garner UAF honores

A record 433 students earned academic honors at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks for the fall 1981 semester. The

record is a reflection of the university's highest enrollment of more than 4,000 students during the fall semester.

In all 128 undergraduates were named to the Chancellor's list for a perfect 4.0 or straight A's. Another 350 received recognition on the Dean's list for grade averages of between 3.5 and 3.99.

Beginning and advanced Inupiaq classes are being offered by the North Slope Borough Community School program again this year and one frequent class visitor is starting homework a little early.

Pinkey Armstrong, wife of the Rev. James Armstrong of the Unpeagvik Presbyterian Church, spent a recent evening thumbing through an Inupiaq-English dictionary and writing the translated names of household items on three-by-five index cards.

Those cards were then taped up throughout the house and Mrs. Armstrong says she will begin asking for items in their Inupiaq version.

Joining Mrs. Armstrong in the beginning Inupiaq classes will be several English-only-speaking Barrow city employees. New city manager Brenda Itta says she has asked the city's non-Inupiaq-speaking workers to take the classes while two Inupiat city employees will take drivers education.
