

Public Health Program Offered

The Master of Public Health Program for American Indians and Alaska Natives is currently recruiting individuals interested in entering graduate school in the field of public health. People interested in this field are generally concerned with developing skills to work on a

problem affecting the health of the community at large. Graduates work as administrators of health programs, as hospital administrators, health educators or policy makers of legislation affecting the future of Indian health.

The program offers training

in such areas of specialization as hospital administration, health administration and planning, environmental health, epidemiology, and health education. A new program is in the field of Native American Alcoholism and Substance Abuse.

Training in the program ranges from 12 to 24 months, depending on the specialization chosen by the student. Included are three to six months of field placement.

The requirements are that each applicant be at least one-quarter American Indian or Alaska Native, have a Bachelor's degree, acceptable grade point average, and a sincere interest in working with Native Americans.
