Wildwood Goes To BIA for Time

The Bureau of Indian Affairs is taking possession of Wildwood AFS facilities for a period of 60 days and on a month-to-month basis thereafter, Sen. Ted Stevens announced today.

Stevens said a formal agreement had been reached between the Department of Defense and Interior, which would give Kenaitze Indians and the AFN time to develop programs for utilizing the base. Stevens said he had been in-

Stevens said he had been informed that rumors indicated that the base was being stripped of equipment which would be useful to the Kenaitze Indians when they take over the facility for educational and training purposes, a program which has received the support of the state, the BIA and the AFN.

Relinquishment Of Wildwood Asked

Senator Ted Stevens asked the Department of Defense to formally declare the undeveloped acreage of Wildwood Air Force Station near Kenai as lands no longer necessary for the Air Force mission.

In his formal request to Secretary of Defense, Melvin Laird, Senator Stevens described the importance of the approximately 4,000 acres to the Kenai Native people who would then be able to utilize these lands as hardship withdrawals under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.
