planning to use them in a book
that I've written on the Pipeline.
There is a picture here of me
so that you will remember who I
am. While you worked at CCP at
Prudhoe, I was the timekeeper
for Parsons that oversaw your
carpenter crew's work at CCP. I
recognized you and knew about
your writings for the
newspapers, Tundra Times and
Fairbanks News-Miner, and we
talked about your beautiful
Athapaskan mittens of moose-
hide and beads, then talked
again at lunch in the carpenter's
shack while you ate lunch.
We also talked a bit and I took
some photos of you while you
worked outside on one of the
Mods, putting up the canvas side
skirts. Later, you invited me
over to your room, and I drove
over one night to talk for a
couple of hours there about
your letters and life in Nulato,
and working on the Pipeline.
Maybe you remember now, from
all of this description and my
photo. Also, we talked about my
being a journalist, too, and how
you knew that I was one and
dreamed that someone would
come to talk to you again, like
it happened at Galbraith
when a journalist interviewed
you. My name is Ken Andrasko.

So, I was working at Prudhoe
collecting material for a book
on the Pipeline to be published
in June or July 1977 by Little,
Brown and Co., a publisher in
Boston. It will be 160 pages
long, and have about 90 black
and white photographs. It's
about how Alaska has changed
because of the Pipeline money
and workers pouring into the

state from Outside to get the big
money. And about how it
affects the Natives, too. I really
enjoyed talking with you at
Prudhoe, and so I included some
of the conversations in my text
for the book. Now, I'm writing
to you to ask your okay that
this material be used, because I
want to contact you and let you
know about it first.

I hope that this will be
acceptable to you. I wrote about
you for my book because I
enjoyed talking to you alot, and
because I felt that you were a
good man who knew alot about
how things work and one who
has made an effort to make
things go better for the younger
people by writing all of those
letters about what's wrong. So
there is this section about you in
the book. Please write to me
if you have any questions or
comments, Fred, or if necessary
call me collect on the telephone.
There is a five hour difference
in time between Alaska and
Boston—we're five hours ahead
of you. I wanted to write and
clear all of this with you before
it gets printed, because we were
friends at Prudhoe.

The section of the book that
talks about you is included here.
You can read it and see if it's
okay. This is what I did: I did
not use my name, but instead
invented a character named Olaf
to replace me in the story, as I
do not appear anywhere in the
book. So the section here is
really about the talks that you
and I had at Prudhoe. Also, to
try to use your exact words, I
have taken copies of letters that
you sent to the News-Miner for
the two years prior to our meet-
ing in Prudhoe, and used your
exact language from them to
present your opinions. So, all of
the things that you say in these
pages from the book are either
things that you said to me in
Prudhoe that I wrote down
right after our talks, or they are
taken from your letters so that
your exact words are used for
subjects we also talked about in
Prudhoe. These letters are in the
public record, because they were
printed in the newspaper.

Anyway Fred, I'm sending
you this writing for you to read
it, and then to sign the release
form that's here too and send it
back to me. The release form is
so that you will be protected, as
it means that you have seen the

writing and think that it's
okay. The form also protects me
and my company, in case any-
body wants to sue us. So this
way, everybody is protected
because everybody has seen the
writing and agreed that it is all
right. If you can read this right
away, and then sign your full
legal name and the date and mail
it back to me at the address
above in Somerville, then every-
thing will be okay, and I will
send you a copy of the book
when it gets published in June or
July.

The book is set up like this.
The first chapter is on the
migration to Alaska from
Outside to get the Pipeline
jobs, and talks about people
driving up and waiting around
to get work. Second is about
Valdez and all the big operations
at the Terminal there, and the
problems they've had. Third is
about Fairbanks, and how things
have been there recently, and
also about Jesse Carr and
Edward Patton. Fourth chapter
is on the Brooks Range, and
building the Haul Road there in

1974, and talks about archeolo-
gists digging up old Eskimo
camps along the road. Then the
last chapter is on Prudhoe in
winter, and includes the pages
about you. The chapter discusses
life in the cold up there, and all
the men in the camps, and how
the work just goes on and on,
and sometimes doesn't make
much sense. So that's about it
on the book.

I haven't seen any of your
letters for about six months
now, because I've been back in
Boston, so I don't know what
you've been up to now. So, I'm
sending this same letter to a
couple of different places so that
one copy will reach you. If you
can read the writing and then
sign and send the release back to
me, I'd really appreciate it, as
the publisher is after me about
it. Well, it's good to be back in
touch, and I look forward to
hearing from you soon. And
maybe even meeting again in
Alaska for a beer or just talking
again!
