

Simulated Acts Will Be Banned

JUNEAU — E. L. Holloway, chairman of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, said that in view of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision in California vs. LaRue and an Anchorage Superior Court ruling last

week the board has proposed for adoption which will prohibit the performance or simulated performance of sexual acts and so-called bottomless dancing in liquor licensed establishments throughout the state.

Both court rulings held that such activities could be banned, through the use of liquor licensing powers, in establishments which serve liquor by the drink.

Holloway said the board will be conducting public hearings throughout the state regarding adoption of the regulations. "The public is invited to attend and let their views be known," he said.

Times and places for hearings will be publicized, with the text of the proposed regulations, well

in advance, he said, pursuant to the Alaska Administrative Procedure Act, AS 44.62.
