A groundbreaking ceremony and blessing were held on June 5 in Anchorage at the future site of the Anchorage Na-

tive Primary Health Care Center. The new 40,000 sq. ft. facility will provide much-needed outpatient examination rooms for family medicine and other ambulatory services through the Alaska Native Medical Center.

agreement between Cook Inlet Region, Inc., Southcentral Foundation and the Indian Health Service. CIRI will build the facility immediately adjacent to the new
