The award given to Mrs. Clark at the banquet Friday came as a surprise to her. She had been told by the association no such award would be made this year.

The banquet is held annually to honor graduating seniors and welcome them as new members of the Alumni Association.

Mrs. Clark was active during her college years here in student government and campus affairs. Following her graduation, she served in Seattle as director of volunteers for the University of Washington Hospital and as Red Cross add etation, sendingen, and Cross aid station chairman, and instructor, but eventually returned to Alaska.

She was appointed head of the Alumni Services and Career Planning and Placement Office in 1961. She revitalized the Alumni Association and established a university-wide graduate counseling and placement office.

Mrs. Clark was also honored

at Sunday's commencement exercises when she was granted "emeritus" status by the university.

Keynote speaker at the ban-quet was Dr. Dan Dafoe, the university's vice president for public service. Dafoe commented briefly on

discontent facing both the University of Alaska and other educational institutions across the nation, saying it could prove healthy for education. "Progress develops where we

have the points of tension and conflict," he said, "not where things have already been set-

Dafoe said he was a firm Datoe said he was a firm believer in the university's state-wide system. "I believe thor-oughly in the concept," he said. "For Alaska it is the best way to go."
