

# Natives recruited for health careers

The Master of Public Health Program for American Indians and Alaska Natives at the University of California at Berkeley is currently recruiting individuals interested in entering graduate school in the field of public health. People interested in this field are generally concerned with developing skills to work on a problem affecting the

health of the public or community at large. Their approach is largely focused towards prevention.

The program offers training in specialization as as hospital administration, health administration and planning, environmental health, epidemiology, or health education. A program

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has been developed in the field of Native American Alcoholism and Substance Abuse.

Training in the program ranges anywhere from 12 to 24 months, depending on the specialization chosen by the student. From three to six months of the program are spent in a field placement, the remainder in the school environment.

Requirements are that applicants be at least one-quarter American Indian or Alaska Native, have a Bachelor's degree, and a sincere interest in working with Native Americans, although some experience or knowledge of the health field is preferred. Applicants interested in applying
