**ORDINANCE 74-16:**  
 An ordinance relating to a debt of  
 the North Slope Borough authorizing  
 the issuance of general obligation  
 bonds of said borough in an amount  
 not to exceed the sum of TEN  
 MILLION DOLLARS (\$10,000,000)  
 to finance the cost, in whole or  
 in part, of the construction, improve-  
 ment, betterment, repair, recon-  
 struction or acquisition of schools in said  
 borough, together with all necessary  
 appurtenances, equipment, furnishing-  
 ings and facilities, and the acqui-  
 sition of lands or rights in lands in  
 connection therewith, and providing  
 for the submission to the voters of  
 said borough of a proposition ratify-  
 ing the authorization of said bonds.

**ORDINANCE 74-17:**  
 An ordinance relating to a debt of  
 the North Slope Borough authorizing  
 the issuance of general obligation  
 bonds of said borough in an amount  
 not to exceed the sum of TWO  
 MILLION THREE HUNDRED  
 THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,300,000.00)  
 to finance the cost, in whole or  
 in part, of the construction, im-  
 provement, betterment, repair, re-  
 construction, or acquisition of public  
 roads, streets, sidewalks, water  
 course and flood control facilities  
 in said borough, together with all  
 appurtenances, equipment and facili-

 sion to the voters of said borough of  
 a proposition ratifying the authoriza-  
 tion of said bonds.

**Summary of Ordinance 74-16:**  
 The ordinance is a non-code ordi-  
 nance. The ordinance authorizes the  
 issuance of General Obligation Bonds  
 of the North Slope Borough, Alaska  
 in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000.00  
 for the purpose of paying the cost,  
 in whole or in part, of the construction,  
 improvement, betterment, repair, recon-  
 struction or acquisition of schools in the  
 North Slope Borough; a proposition ratify-  
 ing the authorization of said bonds  
 shall be submitted to the qualified  
 voters of the North Slope Borough at  
 an election to be held October 1,  
 1974, said election to be held in  
 accordance with the laws of the State  
 of Alaska and applicable ordinances  
 of the North Slope Borough. The  
 ordinance provides that if the issuance

**SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 74-24:**  
 This ordinance is a code ordi-  
 nance and adopts Sec. 54.20.030  
 as a part of the Code of Ordinances  
 of the North Slope Borough. The or-  
 dinance suspends the levy and col-  
 lection of the North Slope Borough  
 Sales Tax and the North Slope Bor-  
 ough Use Tax as of August 1, 1974.  
 Also as of August 1, 1974, the or-  
 dinance suspends the administration,  
 registration and reporting require-  
 ments incident to the levy and col-  
 lection of the North Slope Borough  
 Sales and Use Tax.

**SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 72-3-2:**  
 This ordinance is a code ordi-  
 nance and amends Section 11.050  
 of the North Slope Borough Code  
 by providing for compensation to  
 assemblymen and school board  
 officials in the amount of \$350.00  
 for attendance at each regular monthly  
 meeting and in the amount of  
 \$50.00 for attendance at special  
 meetings.

**SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 72-6-1:**

This ordinance is a code ordi-  
 nance and repeals and re-enacts  
 Section 44.05.100 of the North Slope  
 Borough Code. The ordinance regu-  
 lates official travel within and out-  
 side of the North Slope Borough  
 and allows per diem for unsupported  
 travel at the rate of \$65.00 per  
 day and \$15.00 per day for support-  
 ed travel. In addition for non-salaried  
 elected officials of the Borough the  
 sum of \$150.00 per day is paid for  
 loss of employment compensation  
 together with \$100.00 per diem.  
 Any such travel must be approved  
 in advance by the assembly or the  
 school board, as the case may be;  
 provided that the mayor may in  
 cases of emergency request travel  
 by elected officials, but such travel  
 must be later approved by the as-  
 sembly or the school board.

"He turned his son over gen-

 shouted in agony, 'NAHKA,  
 NAHKA' (NO, NO!)"

"Amagook's face paled into  
 a deathly mask. What he saw  
 was a terrifying sight! Ting-  
 meak's face was unrecognizable.  
 There were tiny sea animals  
 crawling all over it! Tingmeak  
 was dead . . .!"

Samaroona paused in telling  
 of the eerie tale. I was spell-  
 bound — almost unable to move.

"The ending of this legend  
 has never been made certain by
