An individually allotted Native tract of land is being offered for lease on behalf of the Native owner in an advertisement issued Aug. 16, 1974, for proposals to be received until September 27, 1974, by the Anchorage agency, Bureau of Indian Affairs, 1675 "C" Street, Anchorage, Alaska.

The land is a five-acre parcel located on the south shore of Trapper Lake across the Susitna River from Caswell, Alaska and the Anchorage-Fairbanks Highway with access by float plane, ideally situated for a secluded recreational homesite or lodge.

GENE GUESS for U.S. SENATE



Gene Guess served in the Alaska House of Representatives for 8 years. During those years, Gene Guess demonstrated his concern and his effectiveness for the Native people of Alaska. Criticized by some from Anchorage, Gene Guess continued to be effective for the Native people and to help the representatives from rural Alaska with crucial legislation.
