Each seminar is followed by a question-and-answer period in which students are free to challenge or weigh the point of view

presented. Smaller, post-seminar discussion groups and "tietogether" sessions give the students an opportunity to evaluate what they have heard and make an informed judgement on the realities of the exercise of power in our modern democratic system.

Several of the seminars are on-site briefings at Federal agencies and on Capitol Hill. The curriculum focuses upon the nature of the Federal institutions and the decision making processes that are responsible for the formation of national public poli-

The goal of the program is to foster leadership potential and civic responsibility among the student leaders by exposing them to the dynamics of our democratic system at its nucleus - Washington, D.C.

Chartered in 1968 as a nonprofit educational program, Presidential Classroom has provided more than 18,000 young people with first hand exposure to prominent government leaders and key observers of Washington, D.C. Among the past speakers have been Senators, Representatives, Justices of the Supreme

Court, Cabinet Secretaries. members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, foreign ambassadors. White House staff, news media personnel and high level executives from many different Federal agencies and the private nomic diversity of their peers
