Steelers roll to 'Super' win

The Pittsburgh Steelers wrapped up the 1979 Super Bowl with a convincing 35-31 victory over the defending champion Dallas Cowboys. The Steeler victory allowed the Steelers to become the first NFL team to win three Super Bowl titles.

In the pre-game promotion much discussion was focused on Pittsburgh's feared "Steel Curtain" defense and the famed "Flex" defense of the Dallas Cowboys. In the end it was the "Terry and Roger Show." Steeler quarterback Terry Bradshaw shredded the "flex" defense of Dallas for a Super Bowl record 318 yards passing and another Super Bowl record 4 touchdown passes. Meanwhile Roger Staubach was throwing for 228 yards and 3 TD passes himself.

With 2 and one-half minutes left in the game and Steelers leading the Cowboys 35-17 the Steelers vaunted defense rela-

xed, the Cowboys then scored on a 7-yard TD pass from Staubach to Billy Joe DuPree. The Cowboys then booted an onside kick which they recovered and converted into the game's final score.

Terry Bradshaw was named the game's Most Valuable Player for his efforts. Bradshaw's receiving corp led by Lynn Swann with 7 receptions and for 124 yards and a touchdown and John Stallworth who caught 3 passes for 115 yards and 2

touchdowns provided more than capable targets for MVP Bradshaw.

Steeler running back Franco Harris established a lifetime Super Bowl rushing record of 308 yards in 3 games. Harris also established the record for most rushing attempts, 81 attempts in 3 games.

True to the Tundra Times prediction this Super Bowl turned out to be not only the most exciting in recent history but perhaps the most exciting ever.
