in Native arts and crafts, Native language, Native history and Native music and dance.

The following recommenda-tions were passed at the conference.

1) Conference delegates pledged support of the Native Studies Program at Sheldon Jackson College and to its director, Henry Davis.

2) A committee was established to obtain funding for the next conference. Cy Peck, Juneau, will chair the committee and George Davis, Andy Hope and Henry Davis will work with the Tides People Corporation of Juneau to

draft a proposal for funding.

3) Delegates emphasized that a means of protecting oral tradition must be found and it must be determined to whom the tradition

belongs.

4) The SJC Native Studies Director was authorized to contact all museums in the state regarding a policy to cover the question of state museums being the caretakers of Native artifacts. ownership has to be established because Native people feel deprived of their emblems.

5) Conference participants recommended that something be done in the future to avoid

done in the future to avoid misinterpretation and confused statements of anthropologists when they are interviewing Natives for the writing of textbooks.

### To Build Alaska McN Center

Ivan W. Hanson, Alaska district manager for the U.S. Postal Service announces a \$7,447,000 contract to build a modern mail processing center to serve Alaska has been awarded to Howard S. Lease Construction Company and

Associates, Anchorage.

The 157,000 sq. ft. facility will be erected adjacent to the Anchorage airport on a leased postal site.

The industrial-type building will serve the entire State of Alaska, an area measuring 586,000 square miles in size and covering four time zones

The new facility, expected to be ready for occupancy by the winter of 1977, will serve about 200 Alaskan post offices, nearly 70 per cent of which can be reached only by air. The Anchorage facility will also

serve as a gateway mail center for the growing volume of mail coming into and going out of

Much of that volume is devoted to supplying the people of Alaska with the staples of their everyday

lives.

Each year postal employes in Anchorage ship approximately 3.6 billion pounds of grocery items, mainly by air to points throughout the state. Many are about the Arctic Circle. above the Arctic Circle.

The new center was designed by the architectural and engineering firm of Maynard NBBJ, also of Anchorage.
