


In a conference of elders ...

Northwest Inupiat Elders Conference

The Northwest Inupiat Elders Conference, running January 10-22 at Kotzebue, is recording on videotape and with tape recorders a variety of opinions of the area's elders on subjects ranging from the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act to the means of survival in the arctic. In addition to long days of taping stories, songs and legends, the elders are having some fun listening to Eskimo songs by Raconteur Chester Seveck, Eskimo dancing and demonstrating delicious Native cooking, like Eskimo ice cream.
