7-13, will be video taped with six half-hour instructional programs to be produced afterward.

Institute Arctica intends to make students more aware of their own role as members of an Inupiat Nation in the NANA region, and to better prepare them for the crucial days following 1991, when Native lands and business interests now protected will be opened up to taxes and the free market.
