

Adopted Korean Boy Times' Top Salesman

A top Tundra Times salesman in southeastern Alaska is young Harold Riach, of Wrangell, a young adopted Korean youngster who sells 80 papers a week in that southeastern community.

"I don't know which I like to do better, playing basketball or selling newspapers,"

Harold told the Tundra Times he is making plans to sell garnets and sea shells to the tourists this summer.

"They think I'm Eskimo or Indian," he said, "but really I'm Korean. I came to America in 1965 with my brother and sister. Now I have another sister who is Korean and a brother who is Eskimo and Tsimpshean Indian. All five of us are adopted," he wrote.

In addition to selling newspapers and planning his promotion of seashells and garnets for the coming season, Harold sends the Tundra Times news items.

This week he wrote that Wrangell High lost two basketball games to Ketchikan, and that the 5th and 6th grade boys
