SEALED bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials, and equipment and performing all work for Project S-0208(1), Bethel Airport to Brown's Slough, described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time June 26, 1969, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project consists of grading and drainage of 4.28 miles of roadway and relocation of electric power and communication utilities.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 19,000 cubic yards of unclassified excavation; 128,000 cubic yards of borrow and selected material; 13,300 cubic yards of crushed aggregate base; 15,300 cubic yards of sub-base B; 3,500 linear feet of pipe conduit ranging in size between 18" and 36" diameter; 1,600 linear feet of culvert thaw pipes; 13,300 cubic yards of gravel slope protection; electric power and communication facilities to be adjusted, all required; and miscellaneous items or work.

All work shall be completed by August 1, 1970.

Manpower Experts For Outlying Areas

JUNEAU—A mobile team of manpower specialists from the State Department of Labor has been formed in Alaska to bring manpower services to rural areas of the State.

Labor Commissioner Thomas J. Moore said the team will operate under what is known nationally as the "Smaller Communities Program," and the initial community to be served will be Barrow, Alaska.

"This program is a first for Alaska," said Moore. "It should help our objective of bringing increased opportunity to residents of rural communities."

The rural manpower team will provide remote area residents with such services as interviewing and application-taking, employment counseling and testing, job development, job referral and placement, referral to job training facilities or supportive services of other agencies.

As a by-product of the team's survey of the human resources in a community and a compilation of its physical resources, a summary manpower report is produced which would contain a skill inventory, community manpower profile, and economic data.

"Such a report should be useful in enabling employers to identify availability of workers with the skill or skill potential needed to fill their jobs, and it also should be helpful in attracting new industry to the area," said Moore.

Local communities selected for the Smaller Communities program customarily provide office space for the mobile group who may stay from one to two months in a community.

"With the adjacent North Slope oil development, the Barrow area is eager for expanded manpower services and employment assistance. Our Smaller Communities Program is designed to fill this need, and I hope that our activities in this initial Barrow effort will give us the ex-

Eighty Natives Enroll In UA Upward Bound

COLLEGE—The University of Alaska's Upward Bound Program for high school students began Monday (June 16) with an expected 80 students from villages around the state.

The program runs through Aug. 8 and is intended to encourage high school students who show potential toward higher education but who without help might not succeed. Upward Bound at UA is operated in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Education.

Explosive— Forest Fire Danger

The forest fire danger in much of Southcentral and Interior Alaska became extreme in the latter part of May and is expected to continue through June, which is normally a dry month.

The fire season to date is the worst since 1957 and possibly the worst since the mid 40's. It is also a record early fire season.

In order to help reduce the danger of uncontrolled fires, a public order was issued prohibiting all open and uncontrolled fires such as berm, slash, debris, rubbish, grass and cropland fires on all state and private lands in the Greater Anchorage area, Matanuska-Susitna and Fairbanks boroughs.

The original order of May 21 was supplemented May 26 with a public order additionally closing most of the Kenai Peninsula, Susitna, Matanuska and Copper River Valleys and the area from the Alaska Range north to the Yukon River and from the headwaters of the Kuskokwim River east of the Alaska-Yukon border.

In addition to the closures by

the state, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife has closed the Kenai National Moose Range to uncontrolled burning and the Forest Service has closed portions of the Chugach National Forest.

The closure to uncontrolled burning will continue in effect until further notice.
