Senator E. L. Bartlett announced existing state and federal programs that he has called a conference on in relation to native housing needs Alaska native housing in Anch- and to evaluate new proposals,"

> One purpose of the meeting will be to gather information from the various pgencies and individuals concerned with the housing problem in preparation for hearings on a bill Bartlett introduced this session.

The bill would authorize \$10 million for a native housing program. The Housing Subcommittee of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee plans to hold hearings on the measure next year.

Bartiet pointed out that existing federal programs were not applicable in Alaska because required building standards and the high cost to push the final price about the

Bartlett's program would be operated by the Alaska State Housing Authority. Natives would pay inieash or by working on the projects. Timber from the area, if available, would be used for construction. Prices would be determined by a native's ability to pay.

The work would be carried out by natives, whether on an individual basis or by community action.

The Alaska Housing Authority and the Bureau of Indian Affairs are cooperating in setting up the conference. Authority officials Tolbert E. EBiott, executive director, and Charles Blemfield, assistant executive director for housing, discussed preliminary plans for the conference with the Senator when they were in Washington last month.

"Many of our native people live in shacks that are in worse condition than ones found in the most deplorable big-city slums," he stated

"Our native villages have many of the same characteristics of city ghettos — overcrowded conditions,

disease and dispair."

"I hope this conference will launch a drive which will result in eradication of those characteristics."

he said.
"I hope, too, that the conference will serve a broader purpose. I hope it will stimulate all of us to increase our efforts to improve all aspects of life in the rural areas of our state. Let us make this conference the beginning of a concerted campaign by state and federal officials toward that end," he said.
