300 Reindeer Being Moved To Togiak

The Ais National Guard began transporting 200 reindeer last Wednesday from 'Nourist Island to Togiak, a distance of about 450 miles. The operation was originally planned for Tuesday but it was delayed 24 hours due to some unexcept.

The religious were tranquilized with a medication that lasts three or four days to expedite the bandling of the sem-wild animals. They were transported by the National Guard's C123 integral.

If was expected that eight trips with the C123 would be necessary transporting about 37 animals in a pad in a three-day operation. The airlift was, expected to be concluded by Friday.
