

New Selawik Hi-School in Use Gravel Asks Park Land

SELAWIK—So far our village of Selawik has had an exciting month of October. Our new high school was finally finished in September. It should have been done last year but power failure and other problems prevented it.

But after many months of waiting the building is now in use. Classes began in it on Sept. 11. There are lots of activities going on now that weren't possible before.

Already movies and dances are better because of having more room and have been successes.

In addition to school use community recreational use is going strongly. Many people are using the gym to get exercise. There are men and women's recreation nights, city league basketball nights, volleyball, etc. Everyone is glad to have the new building in town.

On Oct. 3-4 the Buckland village team came and played basketball against the Selawik team, made up of city and guard players. On Friday night two

20-minute halves were played. It was a close game up to half time, then Selawik pulled ahead in the second half, by a score of 83-52.

On Saturday night the Selawik team won again, in a four, 15-minute quarter game, 121-103. High scorers for both games were Lee Ballot, Ira Smith and George Harbeson for Selawik and Lester Hadley for Buckland.

After the games and at half-times some girls from the Eskimo Dance mini-course of the high school, conducted by Mrs. Jonas Ramoth (Martha) and assisted by Nora Norton, put on a performance that was very much appreciated by the crowd. This mini-course is new this year. The students learn the old Native Culture of our great ancestors.

On Oct. 10-11 the Kiana City League team came to play ball. On Friday the Selawik team won by a score of 76-75. A very close game, we would say!

On Saturday it was a close game of 87-60. High scorers were Wayne Westlake, Kent Wells, Don Brown and Steve Jackson for Kiana. For Selawik it was George Harbeson,

Ira Smith, Lee Ballot and Johnny Mitchell.

So far we have had two villages come to play. Selawik City's team has won three out of four. We enjoyed having our guests both times and hope they come again.

Another new building in town is the new sewer and water treatment plant. It was put into operation about two weeks after the new high school opened. People are doing laundry, taking showers and sauna baths and getting water there.

Nature has played a mischievous part in Selawik this year. Our river first froze on Oct. 3 but warm weather has made the ice very thin and dangerous to walk across. Everyone has to be careful.

The weather has been warm for some time, with several snowstorms. The students that live on the other side of the river from the school haven't missed much, being daring to walk across every day. Some people have fallen through but were able to get out of the chilling water. A few snow-gos went through the ice but they were pulled out.

On Oct. 21 the Oregon Mime Theater came here to entertain the village. The artists' names

BOROUGH ORDINANCE

Serial No. 72-7-3

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FISCAL PROCEDURE ORDINANCE BY MAKING THE ASSEMBLY THE FINANCE COMMITTEE OF THE BOROUGH.

BE IT ENACTED:

Sec. 1. Classification. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature and shall become a part of the Borough code.

Sec. 2. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or any application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Sec. 3. Repeal of Section. North Slope Borough Section 57.05.080 is repealed.

Sec. 4. Adoption of Section. The following annexed section, Sec. 57.05.080, is hereby adopted as a part of this ordinance and Title 57 of the Code of Ordinances of the North Slope Borough.

INTRODUCED: November 4, 1975

Sec. 57.05.080. Review and Audit. The entire Assembly shall constitute the Finance Committee of the Assembly. The Finance Committee shall review the Borough's investment program, and may review all other fiscal matters of the Borough, at least quarterly. Within appropriation limits, the Committee may require an audit at such time as it deems necessary. Such powers of review and audit shall extend to the general government, the School System and any other agency or office of the North Slope Borough.

BOROUGH ORDINANCE

Serial No. 74-25-1

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THOSE PROVISIONS OF THE BOROUGH CODE RELATING TO THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF

THE BOROUGH PUBLIC UTILITY BOARD, BE IT ENACTED:

Sec. 1. Classification. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature and shall become a part of the Borough Code.

Sec. 2. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or any application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Sec. 3. Repeal of Sections. NSB, Sections 42.20.020 and 42.20.030 are repealed.

Sec. 4. Adoption of Sections. The following annexed sections: Sec. 42.20.020 and 42.20.030 are hereby adopted as part of this ordinance and Title 42 of the Code of Ordinances of the North Slope Borough.

Introduced: November 4, 1975

Sec. 42.20.020. Powers and Duties of Public Utility Board. The Board shall:

(1) choose its chairman and vice-chairman;

(2) appoint a manager for the borough public utilities, subject to approval by the Mayor and confirmation by the Assembly;

(3) recommend to the Mayor the conditions under which the public utility manager shall be hired, including but not limited to salary and length of term;

(4) formulate rules and policies of the Borough with respect to its utilities, including but not limited to suggested tariffs and conditions of service, level of service, capital needs and managerial needs; provided that all such rules and policies shall be subject to the approval of the Mayor and Assembly by resolution;

(5) by February 1 of each year submit a budget for the department and the Board to the Director of Administration and Finance for the operation of the Borough's public utilities in the next fiscal year. Said budget must be approved by the Director of Administration and Finance before submission to the Assembly.

(6) perform those duties set forth in Sections 42.10.020 through 42.10.030;

(7) perform other acts not inconsistent with this title; and

(8) develop a long-range public utilities plan for the Borough.

Sec. 42.20.030. Meetings. (a) The Board shall hold at least one regular meeting at a time and place to be fixed by resolution of the Board.

(b) The Chairman of the Board shall act as the presiding officer at all meetings of the Board. In the event of the Chairman's absence or other inability to preside over a meeting of the Board, the vice-chairman shall act in his place.

(c) The Board may hold special meetings upon the request of the Mayor, the Chairman of the Board or upon the request of any two (2) members. Notice of such special meeting shall be given by the Borough Clerk orally or in writing at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time of the meeting unless notice is waived.

(d) A Board member shall be compensated at the rate provided for Assemblymen with respect to regular and special meetings.

(e) A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Actions of the Board may be only upon the vote of a majority of the entire Board.

PUBLIC NOTICE

OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

Notice is hereby given that the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation under the authority vested by AS 46.03.020 (10)(C) and AS 46.03.020 (10)(H) proposes to adopt Drinking Water Regulations in Title 18 of the Alaska Administrative Code, Chapter 80, to implement, interpret and make specific AS 46.03.020 (10)(C), AS 46.03.020 (10)(H), AS 46.03.070 and AS 46.03.130, and to repeal existing Water Supply Regulations in Title 7 of the Alaska Administrative Code, Chapter 14. A summary of these proposed regulations is as follows:

(1) APPLICABILITY. This regulation generally applies to all drinking water systems from which water is available for public consumption. This includes systems providing water to residences, apartments, factories, office buildings, restaurants, schools and other similar facilities, but excludes systems serving only a single family residence.

(2) ALASKA DRINKING WATER STANDARDS. This regulation sets forth drinking water quality standards which establish maximum limits on organic chemicals, inorganic chemicals, bacteriological, physical and radioactive contaminants in water delivered to the consumer.

(3) PROTECTION OF DRINKING WATER SOURCES. This regulation requires protection of surface and subsurface sources of drinking water by:

a) Setting minimum separation distances between a source of drinking water and actual or potential sources of pollution or contamination.

b) Establishing minimum water well construction and operation standards.

c) Prohibiting certain potentially harmful activities in the watershed of a surface or subsurface water supply.

d) Requiring the installation of back flow prevention devices at facilities determined to have a high potential for cross-connections.

(4) GENERAL OPERATING PRACTICES. This regulation prescribes certain mandatory operational practices as follows:

a) Sampling and analysis of the water at routine intervals to determine concentrations of contaminants present.

b) Keeping records and making reports to the Department with specified routine frequency.

c) Informing consumers by way of public notice if the water system is in noncompliance with this regulation.

d) Preparing and maintaining current comprehensive, emergency and master plans of the water system.

(5) WATER TREATMENT AND DISINFECTION. This regulation requires mandatory disinfection of subsurface waters and mandatory disinfection and filtration of surface waters.

(6) PLAN REVIEW. This regulation requires that, prior to any water system construction, plans prepared by a civil engineer licensed in the State of Alaska shall be submitted and approved in writing by the Department.

(7) PENALTIES. A person violating any provision of this regulation may be subject to criminal or civil penalties as prescribed by AS 46.03.760 and AS 46.03.790(a).
