The State Council parcelled out more than \$3.7 million to Council in Haines which had requested funding as a major grantee was given \$63,000 but was

not classified as a major grantee. In order to qualify as a major grantee, an arts organization must be in a certain tax bracket. must have a total budget exceeding \$150,000, must be audited annually by a certified public accountant, and the organization must be able to receive tax deductible contributions.
