## Aid to villagers for fuel costs

Low-income Alaskan residents will receive about \$5 million in aid to pay their heating bills this winter finder legislation approved by a House Senate contented committee last week.

The appropriation bill to the Interior Department and related agencies now goes to the House and Senate for routine approval

About \$5 million will be distributed to low-income residents of Alaska under a formula based on the amount of cold days and the proportion of poor households in the state. Sen. Fed Stevens, tanking Republican

(Continued from page 1) member of the Interior appropriations subcommittee, said the formula is fairer to Alaska than other proposals based on popu-

lation and income levels.

Other provisions sponsored by Stevens that were included in

the final bill are the following:
-\$29.7 million to expand the
Interior Department's gas exploration program at Barrow.

-\$346,000 to expand the Ketchikan clinic, and \$200,000 to expand the Fort Yukon clinic. Also approved were provisions directing the Indian Health Serviceto conduct a feasibility study of purchasing the Alaska Hospital and Medical Center as a replacement for the obsolete Native hospital in Anchorage.

Also in both House and Senate versions of the legislation, and thus not subject to the conference, was \$4.4 million to construct a 40-unit housing facility in Bethel to accompany the new Native hospital being built there.
