Saved by Air Force, Survivor Offers Money for Rescue

This story starts on an ice floe in Bristol Bay over a month ago. Migley Kelly, a native fisherman, was pursuing his livelihood when the chunk of ice on which he was fishing broke loose. Kelly spent 15 hours on the drifting ice floe before an H-21 helicopter, piloted by 1st Lt. Hal Rhodes, rescued him.

A "thank you" letter was received recently by Lieutenant Rhodes signed by Migley Kelly. Enclosed was a fivedollar bill.

Lt. Rhodes, however, as an officer of the U.S. Air Force, was not permitted to keep the money for his personal use and he duly turned it over to the Alaskan Air Command Comptroller, Col. V.J. Weigle.
