Hunt move loses

A procedural maneuver designed to free a bill calling for repeal of the state's subsistence law was defeated by the state House of Representatives last week.

Rep. Ramona Barnes, R-Anchorage, had called for a full House vote to move the bill out of the House Committee on Subsistence to the Resources Committee, but the call was defeated 16-23.

Rep. Tony Vaska, D-Bethel, chairman of the subsistence committee, said the committee would issue a full report once public hearings were completed, but that the efforts of the committee would be wasted if the bill were advanced sooner.

The vote reflected not so much the House's feelings about the subsistence issue as it did an adherence to rules of procedure. The major source of votes for the defeat came from the efforts of Rep. Sam Cotten, D-Eagle River, who rallied the Democratic Causcus against the move, saying it violated legislative procedure.

Barnes, a member of the subsistence committee, has been the leader of a move to repeal the state's subsistence law, which (Continued on Page nine)

As the subsistence issued smoldered in the legislature, the Alaska Rural Development Council "hast" week named six of its members to a special legislative task force to thoroughly study the subsistence issue and to meet with legislators to work out some suitable approach to the volatile issue.
