

BP Technological Program—

6 Natives Get Scholarships

ANCHORAGE, AUGUST 26, 1974 — Six native students — five men and one woman — from villages all over Alaska have been awarded scholarships under BP Alaska's \$76,000 two-year petroleum technology program, the company announced today.

They all have attained high standards in mathematics and science. The students were picked by a selection committee chaired by BP's Bill Pope, Manager, General Engineering and Maintenance. Fred Bigjim, Assistant Professor at Alaska Methodist University and Tom Wagoner, Coordinator of the Kenai Community College VO-Tech Program, assisted Pope in the selections.

The students, drawn from 30 names submitted by Native, State and Federal organizations, are: Steven Eric Brown (20) of Barrow; Gilbert S. Long (26) of Kotzebue; Ronald Olsen Yatlin (22) of Huslia; Mischa Joseph Auliye (24) of Nome; Aloysius Anthony Mayac (24) of King Island; and Vivian Lee Miller Cole (25) of Bethel.

Mayac is a well known ivory carver and Brown is an accomplished ballroom dancer. Two of the other students are considerably talented. Long, who plays a guitar, has his own dance band and Miss Cole does acrylic painting as well as needlepoint.

Brown attended Mount Edgecumbe High School and Auliye the William E. Beltz Regional High School in Nome. Mayac was a student at the Copper Valley High School in Glenallen and Miss Cole and Yatlin attended the University of Alaska. Long has been student at Western State College of Engineering in California.

On completion of the course, which starts about the middle of September, the students will be awarded an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Petroleum Technology.

The students will work at Prudhoe Bay during the summer of 1975 to get some practical field training.

Petroleum Product Overpricing

SEATTLE — Investigations of petroleum products overpricing during the month of July resulted in more than \$300,000 in refunds to customers in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon and Washington, according to Northwest Federal Energy Regional Administrator, Jack B. Robertson.

FEA investigators completed 147 investigations during the month and found 81 violations of price regulations, 77 of which were at retail gasoline outlets. Other pricing investigations included heating oil and other middle distillates.

Refunds to the general public through gasoline outlets totaled \$291,900. These refunds are ordered when FEA investigators find that a particular dealer has been overcharging. The dealer is asked to roll back his prices enough to make up for the amount he has overcharged.

In the case of heating oil and other middle distillates, the actual customers can be identified and refunds are made to those customers. The amount of refunds during July for heating oil and other middle distillates was about \$8,000.

"We are now into a point in our compliance activities where we can give some special attention to follow-ups of previous violations."

The first pricing offense may stem from misunderstandings about the regulations, but once our investigators have visited a dealer there is no excuse for another violation," he said.

Maximum penalties for pricing violations under the Mandatory Petroleum Allocation regulations are \$2,500 for each civil violation and \$5,000 for each criminal violation.

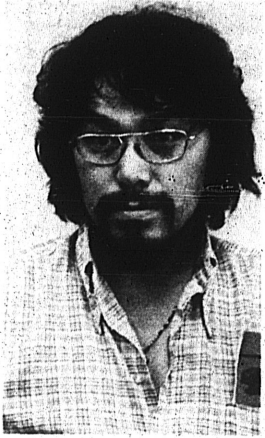
