The new executive director first became involved in the land claims movement when serving as director of the Native Welcome Center in Anchorage in

She went to Washington, D.C. to lobby for passage of the land claims act and for minority manpower training programs.

She worked in economic development for the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation and served briefly as city manager of Barrow last year before moving to Fairbanks and becoming executive secretary to Demientieff, a post she vacated to become executive director.

The wife of Abel Akpik, president of the village corporation at Pt. Lay, she spent the past summer whaling on the North Slope.
