Second, that additional teach ers for this program be recruited,

ers for this program be recruited, keeping in mind the following: I. 45-60 students are expect-ed which would qualify for a minimum of three regular and one special teacher, 2. qualification

qualification of one teach er to act as vice-principal or head teacher of the high school pro-

qualifications of teachers aggregately to teach in the areas of industrial arts, home economics, English, science, mathematics, business, vocational education, etc. qualifications of existing

4. qualifications of existing teachers in Noorvik,
5. possibly using village people for part-time positions,
6. Noorvik Advisory School Board making final selection of teachers to be hired.

Third, that students needs be assessed or gone over again in order to place necessary orders as soon as possible for the following types of supplies and equipment: equipment

desks, chairs and other necessary classroom furniture

industrial arts supplies and equipment,

home economics supplies and equipment,

diately a qualified person or persons be sent to Noorvik from the central ASOSS office to meet with the Noorvik administrator, faculty and advisory school board to determine and order all necessary items in the list above

Some of these students who come home for the holidays will not be returning to Mt. Edgecumbe and Kenai which makes it even more important and doubly insistent that we have the assurance as soon as possible that the above proposal or a similar one be instigated at once.
