a few months to two years in Job Corps. Each month he

will receive \$30 spending money. When he leaves the Job Corps, he will receive an additional \$50 for each month of satisfactory service.

If a Corpsman has been helping support his family in the past, he may send home up to \$25 a month. This amount will be matched by the Job Corps.
