WASHINGTON - Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, said he is pleased at the progress of Senate

pleased at the progress of Senate and House conferees who have tentatively agreed to transfer jurisdiction of the Petroleum Reserve No. Four (Pet 4) in Alaska from the Navy to the Department of Interior.

Gravel, who has been pushing legislation for such a transfer since December of 1973, fought his latest fight last July for transfer of the reserve, coupled with a study of socio-economic with a study of socio-economic impact of exploration and pos-sible development of oil and gas, as well as a study of the land resource values.

The conference committee on the Naval Petroleum Reserve legislation is scheduled to meet again Monday, with prospects of completing agreement by Dec. 19.

Gravel met with Charlie Ed-wardsen, who is representing the North Slope Borough and has been lobbying the Pet. Four legislation with members of the Conference Committee. The Alaska lawmaker said that Edwardsen and North Slope Borough Mayor Eben Hopson "have done a real service" in negotiating for the transfer with members of the Conference Committee. "They've obviously made a good case," Gravel noted.

The committee has tentatively agreed to retain jurisdiction of the Naval Reserves Numbers One, Two and Three with the Navy, but to shift jurisdiction of Pet. 4 to Interior.

Edwardsen reported to Gravel Edwardsen reported to Gravel that the committee now is work-ing on the particulars of the transfer and it appears that a study will be undertaken rela-tive to the people, land and re-source values of the total de-velopment of vast land area of the reserve of the reserve.

Gravel had urged earlier this year that a task force be established under the direction of the Secretary of Interior, and in-clude representatives of the state and local governments as well as others such as the Fish and Wildlife Service, to study and review the values and best uses of the public domain lands in Pet. 4. The study, he said, should include such values as subsistence lands for Natives scenic historilands for Natives, scenic, histori-cal, recreational, fish and wild-life, wilderness and other purposes.
