

Sue Gets H. Rock Fellowship

FAIRBANKS — Sue Gamache, an Athabascan Indian from Anchorage, has been awarded the 1975-76 Howard Rock Fellowship presented by the Alaskan Arctic Gas Study Company through the University of Alaska, according to Dr. B.G. Olson, head of the Department of Journalism.

Miss Gamache, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Gamache, said she believes the fellowship will be an opportunity to add to her own knowledge of Native affairs and politics as well as to communicate information to other people.

The Fellowship carries with it a \$250 a month stipend and an

opportunity to gain practical experience working with the Tundra Times, Alaska's Eskimo, Indian and Aleut newspaper.

Miss Gamache is a sophomore majoring in journalism. She was graduated in 1974 from Robert Service High School where she became interested in journalism and wrote articles for the Anchorage Times as part of her high school academic work.

In addition to newspaper work, she is also interested in photojournalism and magazine writing.

The fellowship was named for Howard Rock, Point Hope artist and longtime editor of the

Tundra Times. In presenting the grant to the university, Robert W. Ward, Arctic Gas president, said, "We have always been grateful for the opportunity to support the Tundra Times and the University through this fellowship and are pleased with the accomplishments of the four recipients who have preceded Sue. They have already contributed greatly to Alaskan journalism and each has a promising future."

Miss Gamache and other recent Howard Rock fellowship recipients will be honored at the Tundra Times banquet in Anchorage Oct. 23.
