To Upgrade Legal Services— Big Step for KACDC

Kodiak Island took yet another big step today towards upgrading the quality of its legal services as the Kodiak Area Community Development Corporation (KACDC) was officially awarded a \$58,237 grant package to set up a comprehensive legal aid program for the poor and disadvantaged people on the island.

The grant was, for the most part, made possible by the Campaign for Human Development, a nationally-based organization run by the Catholic Church that results from an annual collection in Catholic parishes throughout the country on the Sunday before Thanksgiving each year.

On the heels of the State's decision to have a full-time Superior Court judge on the island, and the recent swearing-in of Roy Madsen as the newly appointed judge, the CHD award to KACDC now makes the legal services available to the low-income people on Kodiak Island comparable to that of the rest of the State.

Father Lawrence McNamara, the Executive Director of the CHD office in Washington, D.C., made the formal announcement today in a Spokane news conference of his office's recent decision to award a \$16,750 grant to KACDC, which is a delegate agency of the state Rural CAP program and whose offices are in the Kodiak Airways building.

With this announcement, a \$19,500 contribution from the Alaska Legal Services Corporation and \$21,987 in monies through the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) have subsequently released to KACDC, thus making the legal aid grant package total \$58,237.

The grant proposal, submitted by KACDC last January, was one of the many 1200 funding requests turned in to CHD this year. The Kodiak Island Legal Aid Program, however, was the only proposal in the state of Alaska that was funded, and much of the credit for this can be given to Okey Chandler, who gathered some 800 signatures on petitions he passed around town, and Father John O'Donoghue, from St. Mary's Catholic Church

in Kodiak, whose recommendations to Washington, D.C. were instrumental in the approval of the grant.

Although official announcement of the grant was not made public until today, implementation of the grant has already begun. The Alaska Legal Service Corporation has transferred one of their attorneys from Anchorage, Matt Jamin, to practice law here in town and in our surrounding villages.

In addition to practicing law in the courtroom, Matt is now teaching it in the classroom at the Kodiak Community College.

Moreover, through Operation CETA, Matt has been able to hire an assistant, Clifford Panamarioff from Ouzinkie, to act as his paralegal, and Valerie Knagin from Port Lions, to serve as his secretary. Their office is now in Room 47 of the Courthouse building.

The Kodiak Island Legal Aid Program will be run on a cost-free basis; those people found to be eligible for legal aid will have the services of an attorney provided to them at no cost whatsoever.

Unlike a Public Defender who can only handle cases of a criminal nature, the attorney here will be able to provide legal aid in both criminal and civil cases.

Eligibility for free legal assistance is determined by the financial capabilities of the applicant (prior net income, number of dependents, assets and liabilities, etc.).

PROPOSED CHANGES IN
THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA
DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

Notice is hereby given that the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation under the authority vested by AS 46.03.020 (10)(C) and AS 46.03.020 (10)(H) proposes to adopt Drinking Water Regulations in Title 18 of the Alaska Administrative Code, Chapter 80, to implement, interpret and make specific AS 46.03.020 (10)(C), AS 46.03.020 (10)(H), AS 46.03.070 and AS 46.03.130, and to repeal existing Water Supply Regulations in Title 7 of the Alaska Administrative Code, Chapter 14. A summary of these proposed regulations is as follows:

(1) APPLICABILITY. This regulation generally applies to all drinking water systems from which water is available for public consumption. This includes systems providing water to residences, apartments, factories, office buildings, restaurants, schools and other similar facilities, but excludes systems serving only a single family residence.

(2) ALASKA DRINKING WATER STANDARDS. This regulation sets forth drinking water quality standards which establish maximum limits on organic chemicals, inorganic chemicals, bacteriological, physical and radioactive contaminants in water delivered to the consumer.

(3) PROTECTION OF DRINKING WATER SOURCES. This regulation requires protection of surface and subsurface sources of drinking water by:

a) Setting minimum separation distances between a source of drinking water and actual or potential sources of pollution or contamination.

b) Establishing minimum water well construction and operation standards.

c) Prohibiting certain potentially harmful activities in the watershed of a surface or subsurface water supply.

d) Requiring the installation of back flow prevention devices at facilities determined to have a high potential for cross-connections.

(4) GENERAL OPERATING PRACTICES. This regulation prescribes certain mandatory operational practices as follows:

a) Sampling and analysis of the water at routine intervals to determine concentrations of contaminants present.

b) Keeping records and making reports to the Department with specified routine frequency.

c) Informing consumers by way of public notice if the water system is in noncompliance with this regulation.

d) Preparing and maintaining current comprehensive, emergency and master plans of the water system.

(5) WATER TREATMENT AND DISINFECTION. This regulation requires mandatory disinfection of subsurface waters and mandatory disinfection and filtration of surface waters.

(6) PLAN REVIEW. This regulation requires that, prior to any water system construction, plans prepared by a civil engineer licensed in the State of Alaska shall be submitted and approved in writing by the Department.

(7) PENALTIES. A person violating any provision of this regulation may be subject to criminal or civil penalties as prescribed by AS 46.03.760 and AS 46.03.790(a).
