Iditarod underway

Three former champs in the field

ANCHORAGE - Three former Iditarod Trail race champions led a pack of 55 mushers out of Mulcahy ball park in Anchorage on Saturday for the long trek to Nome. The champions are Rick Swenson of Eureka who won the race in 1977. Jerry Riley of Nenana who won in 1976, and Emmitt Peters of Ruby who won in 1975. Absent from the field for the first time was Iditarod President Dick Mackey of Wasilla. Mackey who had run every Iditarod since 1973 was also the defending champion. This leaves Ken Chase of Anvik as the only man who has started 15. John Wood, Chugiak every Iditarod race since the race began in 1973.

Swenson finished the '77 Iditarod in 16 days, 16 hours, 27 minutes and 13 seconds, and Riley won the '76 race in a time of 18 days, 22 hours, 58 minutes and 17 seconds. Emmitt Peters won the '75 Iditarod with a record setting pace that still stands today, 14 days, 14 hours, 43 minutes and 45 seconds.

Herbert Nayokpuk of Shishmaref who placed fourth in '75. third in '74 and fifth in '73, was back in the field after a three year absence. Isaac Okleasik of Teller who finished sixth in 1973 and won the 50-mile 1967 Iditarod Centennial Race will also run the race for the first time in several years. Don Honea and Howard Albert both of Ruby are included in a trio of teams in the race from the small Yukon River community, "Eep" Anderson, one half of the Flying Anderson brothers was in the field as well as the father of the Iditarod, Joe Redington Sr., of

If the weather conditions stay as favorable as they have been it is very likely that a new record may be established this year.
