Also, Nelson Ahvakana will be transferred to Barter Island for the summer.



Spot was not killed by the fangs of the two huge malemutes. He was killed by the chain around his neck. There is little doubt that he would have sur-vived if it hadn't been for the awful hindrance. This was borne out by the terrible marks he left on his attackers.

Spot had to fight all the way through his life. He didn't shrink from his enemies – vicious dogs and the treacherous north coun-

try. Yes, Spot, a mere mongrel, had an unmistakable niche in the scheme of things in the north. A courageous heart in a strong body is a necessary facet of survival of man in the Arctic.

The purpose of the office is to process employment appli-cations for administrative, professional and clerical jobs only. The office, at 845 K Street, will be open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Mondays through Saturdays.

The offices will accept applications for non-construction jobs for Alyeska and its manage-ment contractor for construction of the pipeline terminal, at Valdez, and of pumping stations, for the trans Alaska pipeline. An Alyeska spokesman said persons seeking construction

jobs on the pipeline project should not make application to Alyeska or its management contractors, but should directly apply to execution contractors chosen to perform the con-struction work, or should contact labor union locals. should

Announcements of contracts varded thus far have been awarded available to the news made media; other contracts will be similarly announced as the additional contractors are chosen
