Pete came down for hospital treatment, and he said, he will have to come back few more weeks, then instead of waiting here that long, he said, he'll probably will have to go back to Barrow, tomorrow Tuesday, as he can't wait that long.

Mr. Shovalik, almost forgot to mention another whale, that was caught by Mr. Robert Aiken, an Eskimo. They caught one also Saturday morning, May 4. Two other canoes lost two that same week. Mr. Aiken is an employee of Native Hospital for several years.

This again means that the Barrow people can have Nalukatak Festivals in June, what day we do not know.

Unbelievable

Old-timer Mr. Arctic John Etalook, 81, who was in Fairbanks several years, said that all these years he never did know or seen, the weather like we have now was unbelievable.

All these years he'd seen the weather here always calm and wonderful. Now it is different winter altogether.

Even he said, by his judgment, the sun seems even high as it was never before.

Mr. Etalook, 81 years of age, and he looks like as if he is middle 50's.

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Non-construction Pipeline Jobs Office Opens

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA, May 10, 1974 — An employment office for non-construction jobs on the trans Alaska pipeline project has been established in Anchorage.

The purpose of the office is to process employment applications for administrative, professional and clerical jobs only.

The office, at 845 K Street, will be open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Mondays through Saturdays.

A similar office for non-construction employment will be established in Fairbanks in the near future.

The offices will accept applications for non-construction jobs for Alyeska and its management contractor for construction of the pipeline terminal, at Valdez, and of pumping stations, for the trans Alaska pipeline.

An Alyeska spokesman said persons seeking construction jobs on the pipeline project should not make application to Alyeska or its management contractors, but should directly apply to execution contractors chosen to perform the construction work, or should contact labor union locals.

Announcements of contracts awarded thus far have been made available to the news media; other contracts will be similarly announced as the additional contractors are chosen.

Every Indian, Eskimo and Aleut, whatever you are, all of you poor people can join us. We can and should move the Capitol to some central location in Alaska.

There's one thing for sure. It can't be any worse for the poor. It can only get better. This is an election year and don't believe half of what you hear from those two-tongued boys who will promise you everything and give you nothing. Vote for your own people. Your own people will give you better than an even break. You have got a better chance for getting something for your village from one of your own people, so if he wants to run, put him in.
