The initial meeting for the Aleutian Planning Commission was held November 1 and 2 at the Kaloa Building in Anchor-

A \$50,000 revenue sharing demonstration grant for the Aleutian Chain was awarded to the Rural Alaska Community Action Program by Region X of the Office of Economic Opportun-

This grant will fund a planning staff to carry out community planning projects in connection the Aleut League and ity planning projects in connection with the Aleut League and the 12 village councils of: King Cove; Unalaska: False Pass; Cold Bay; Belkovsky; Nelson Lagoon; Atka: Nikolski; Akutan; St. Paul Island; St. George Island; and Pauloff Harbor. The formation of the Commission was the direct result of places for proper ect result of pleas for proper representation of the peoples in

the Aleutian region.
At the initial meeting the Commission: chose a Director; incorporated; attained a board structure; and determined Un-alaska as the operation location for the new RurAL CAP regional office.

APUC Authorizes Chugach Electric to Include Tyonek

The Alaska Public Utilities, Commission has granted Churgach Electric Association, Inc authority to include the general vicinity of Tyonek - Granite Point, on the west side of Cook Inlet, in its certificated service

However, CEA was not granted the total additional which it sought.

which it sought.

This action of the Commission came simultaneously with its approval for CEA to acquire and operate the electric generation, transmission, distribution and other related facilities presently owned and operated by the village of Tyonek.

CEA will acquire the Tyonek facilities through lump sum pay-

facilities through lump sum payment and an agreement whereby it will deliver certain quantities of electrical energy to 57 residences and various other private

and public customers.

The Commission did not allow CEA the entire service area addition for which it had made application. In arriving at its decision the Commission its decision the Commission noted that "CEA has requested an additional service area, the boundaries of which extend considerably beyond any lo-cation in which there appears to be an immediate need for service

Consequently, the Commission granted CEA authority to provide service only in that area in which the customers were
