LOST 'PAPERWORK' PUTS POVERTY WORKERS IN BIND Mail Snarl Causes No Pay for Kotzebue

With their pay from ASCAP overdue since February 10. the staff of the Kotzebue Head Start Program has sent

telegrams of complaint to Sargent Shriver, national director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, and to Alaska Congressional Delegation.

ASCAP reports that the delay is caused by lost paperwork.

The Kotzebue staff was supposed to be paid on Feb. 10. When they contacted the regional ASCAP office in Nome, they were told to wait for a few days until the matter could be straightened out by the ASCAP headquarters in Anchorage.

After a week, the staff contacted the Anchorage office and were told by Emil Notti, acting director in the absence of Flore Lekanof, to wait some more and that he (continued on Page 6)

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would do his best to help. The staff answered that they would wait only until quitting time, 2 p.m. Bering Sea Time, because they had already waited a week We already waited a week. When they received no further word, they sent the following telegram to Shriver, Bartlett,

telegram to Shriver, Bartlett, Gruening, and Pollock: "We, the staff of Kotzebue-Head Start Program, have not been paid for the working period of January 30 through February 10. We need money to buy food, fuel and elec-tricity tricity.

"The ASCAP regional office in Nome and the ASCAP headquarters in Anchorage have been con-tacted without results. It is a week that we have not been paid. Money is urgently

paid. Money is urgently needed and we would appre-ciate your help." ASCAP's executive direc-tor, Flore Lekanof, said that the staff had not been paid because the necessary form had not been received by his office. He said that, by reguoffice. He said that, by regu-lation, he could not write out a check until he had this Form 102 to show where the money was going.

Lekanof said that he was trying to track down the form. He added that Don Perkins of the Nome office was on a trip to the villages and Perkins' secretary was on leave, so there was some problem in thoroughly checking through the Nome office for the form.

In addition, Lekanof said, the form could be lost in the mail - it had once taken six weeks for a letter from Kotzebue to reach him in Fairbanks.

At press time, the Kotze but staff had not yet been paid. The missing pay totals \$1,118.40. The Kotzebue Head-Start staff consists of three

stan consists of three teachers, three teacher aids, a cook, her aid, a janitor, and a bookkeeper. All are Native people of Kotzebue. They report that everybody is in need of the money, but one woman with a family of seven children is in need more than the rest.

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more than the rest. "This is the reason why the staff reluctantly took the step of going higher and asking help from the con-gressmen," reported the staff.
