(Continued from Page 2) and a part of my duty to write this letter as the Community Development Coordinator of the Kotzebue Area Health Corporation.

On Sunday, Sept. 8, 1974, the Kotzebue Public Health Ser-vice Hospital, the Alaska State Building, the United States Air Force Site and a number of private subscribers lost contact with local, statewide and "Lower 48" residents due to the malfunctioning of the telephone exchange.

It is my understanding that . John Gilbert of the North State Telephone Co., Inc. was approached by Mr. Murlin Day, Acting Service Unit Director of the Kotzebue PHS Hospital in regards to the situation. Mr. Gilbert verbally agreed, on the tele-phone, with Mr. Day to travel to Kotzebue to correct this sitution. This conversation took place ten (10) days ago, and to this date, Mr. Gilbert is no where to be seen.

There is no local repairman available in the city, as he has apparently resigned. To worsen matters, we have to call the Fair-banks Operator long distance, for assistance in obtaining a local number, as we do not have access to local information.

I am also aware that there is a misunderstanding between the local PHS Hospital and the North Telephone Company, Inc. concerning a settlement over a line being cut a year and a half ago. If this is the case that is holding up repairs, this matter should be duly dealt with.

Due to the fact that the tel-ephone service is not available to the local hospital, if an individual should lose his life because of this, who will foot the "cost" of that life? What happens if a resident needs an am-bulance to get to the hospital? Too many lives are at stake.

Your assistance on this matter will greatly enhance the wellbeing of the people involved. We will look forward to hear-

Be wary if you are asked to pay in advance or to pay cash. The usual procedure is to pay upon completion of the work or in installments as portions of the job are finished.

Make certain that the con-tract completely describes the work to be done, and includes both a starting and completion date.

## **Turnkey Housing Authorized**

Nine southeast Alaska Na-tive Communities will benefit from authorization for 200 units of Turnkey III, homeownership housing, signed on September 18 in the Seattle Area Office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The authorization was in the form of an Annual Contribu-tion Contract signed by Robert form Loescher, Executive Director of the Tlingit-Haida Regional Housing Authority of Juneau and Nile Paull, Acting Director, Seattle

Area Office, HUD. Area Office, HUD. The 200 units approved on the 18th are in additon to 160 units previously approved by HUD.

The 200 homes will be constructed by two joint-venture contracting teams. Each team consists of a Seattle-based contractor and an Alaska Native contractor.

The Joint-Venture of Boyd and Dalton/Wick Construction Company will construct homes in Angoon, Hoonah, Hydaburg,

lake and Klawock while T.O. Paddock Company/Riley Please, Inc. will build in Craig, Haines, Klukwan and Yakutat. It is believed that construction will begin almost immediately

Signing of the contract culminates many months of work and planning. Of particular signi-ficance is the extent of Native involvement in the project. Na-tives and Native businesses will closely involved with all phases of home construction.


