"My parents, everybody sang at home," Angaiak recalls. He can't ever remember learning. All his brothers—eight or nine of them—play the guitar. It sort of came naturally. He's a Yupik Eskimo from

Tununak on Nelson Island. At the moment his life is a little crowded. He's a senior at University of Alaska majoring in sociology and art.

A job with the Bureau of Land Management is paying his way and they like him well enough to take him full time if
