

# Hammond moves office to Anchorage and Fairbanks

Governor Jay Hammond announced today he will move his office to Anchorage and Fairbanks for extended periods during the summer. Hammond said he will be in Anchorage in the first half of July and in Fairbanks during the latter part of the summer.

Hammond said, "This is a major effort to bring State government closer to the people. As Governor during the last 18 months I have made numerous

trips to Anchorage, Fairbanks and other cities.

Most of the visits, however, are short and consistently jammed with speeches and tightly packed schedules. While that does allow me to talk to the greatest number, it leaves little for hearing directly from the people.

Listening is what I want to emphasize during these visits when I will actually be living in the communities."

Hammond plans to live and conduct State business in Anchorage from July 1st through the 17th. The exact dates and details for his Fairbanks stay have not yet been finalized.

He will use the Office of the Governor in both towns as his headquarters, although he said he plans to spend as much time as possible out of the office. "I hope to attend public meetings, to meet informally with various groups, to visit State offices, to

attend luncheons, all with the purpose of hearing what the "regular folks" have on their minds.

Hammond also said, "I will also set time to meet with citizens who might not normally have a chance to get to Juneau.

In the course of a normal day in the Capitol, I meet with company presidents, representatives of interest groups, and V.I.P.'s, if you will. I want to make sure there is time during these visits to meet with M.I.P.'s, the most important people."

Hammond also said while he did not intend to move his entire staff to Anchorage, a few aides would reside there during the visit.

The Governor intends to remain in close phone contact with other members of his Juneau staff. Hammond said he would meet with his commissioners as they traveled to Anchorage in the normal course of their duties.

Finally, the Governor announced he would participate in a live TV Town Meeting on July 15 at the end of his stay in Anchorage. Several commissioners would also appear to answer questions phoned in from the public. Station KAKM will conduct the TV Town Meeting in their studios beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Hammond said, "Alaska is a big State, and everyone can't get to Juneau to see the government, so we're going to take the government to the people."

## Rare totem pole returned to Canada

The National Museum of Man has just repatriated a set of elaborately carved house posts and beams from the Museum of the American Indian in New York City.

The unique forty-two foot long roof beam depicts a Sisiutl (Si-si-ootl) or double headed serpent supported on three upright figures. The Sisiutl which is thought of as having one head in the upper world and the other in the lower world is a cosmological symbol, often represented by a rainbow, among the Kwakiutl Indians of

Vancouver Island.

According to legend, the mythical monster had the power to assume many sizes. To eat, touch or even see the Sisiutl was unlucky and sometimes fatal. But, to those with supernatural power, its blood could turn human skin to stone; its skin used as a belt allowed the wearer to perform wonderful feats; its eyes, when used as sling stones, could kill even whales.

The National Museum of Man's Sisiutl was first erected by the Southern Kwakiutl at the ancient

summer settlement of Tswadi (200 miles northwest of Vancouver). It was collected in 1913 by the Honourable James Donsmuir, and by 1931 was on display in Hatley Park, but was finally acquired by the Heye Foundation for the Museum of the American Indian, Brooklyn.

Its return to Canada was made possible through the Emergency Purchase Fund of the National Museums of Canada.

## New geology textbook published

FAIRBANKS—A textbook on Alaskan geography and geology which emphasizes the interaction of students with their environment has been published by Ran McNally.

The book, "Introductory Geography and Geology and Alaska," was written by University of Alaska Professor of Mining Extension Leo Mark Anthony, and Arthur "Tom" Tunley, an earth science teacher at West Anchorage High School.

It is the first book to cover geography and geology of Alaska in a textbook format and features an opening chapter on geography by University of Alaska Professor of Geography Dr. Donald Lynch.

The text features the history of Alaska's mineral development and the significance of Alaska's mineral resources to this country's national needs.

The book is bound in hard cover and includes multicolored geological and topographical maps of Alaska. Also included are more than 300 illustrations, six appendices, a removable rock-identification wheel, a comprehensive glossary, and a detailed index.
